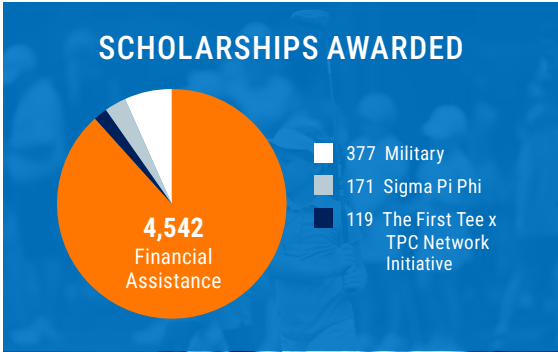

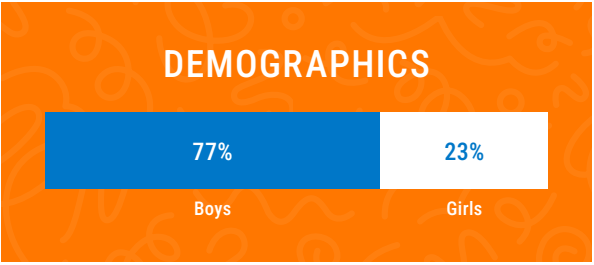

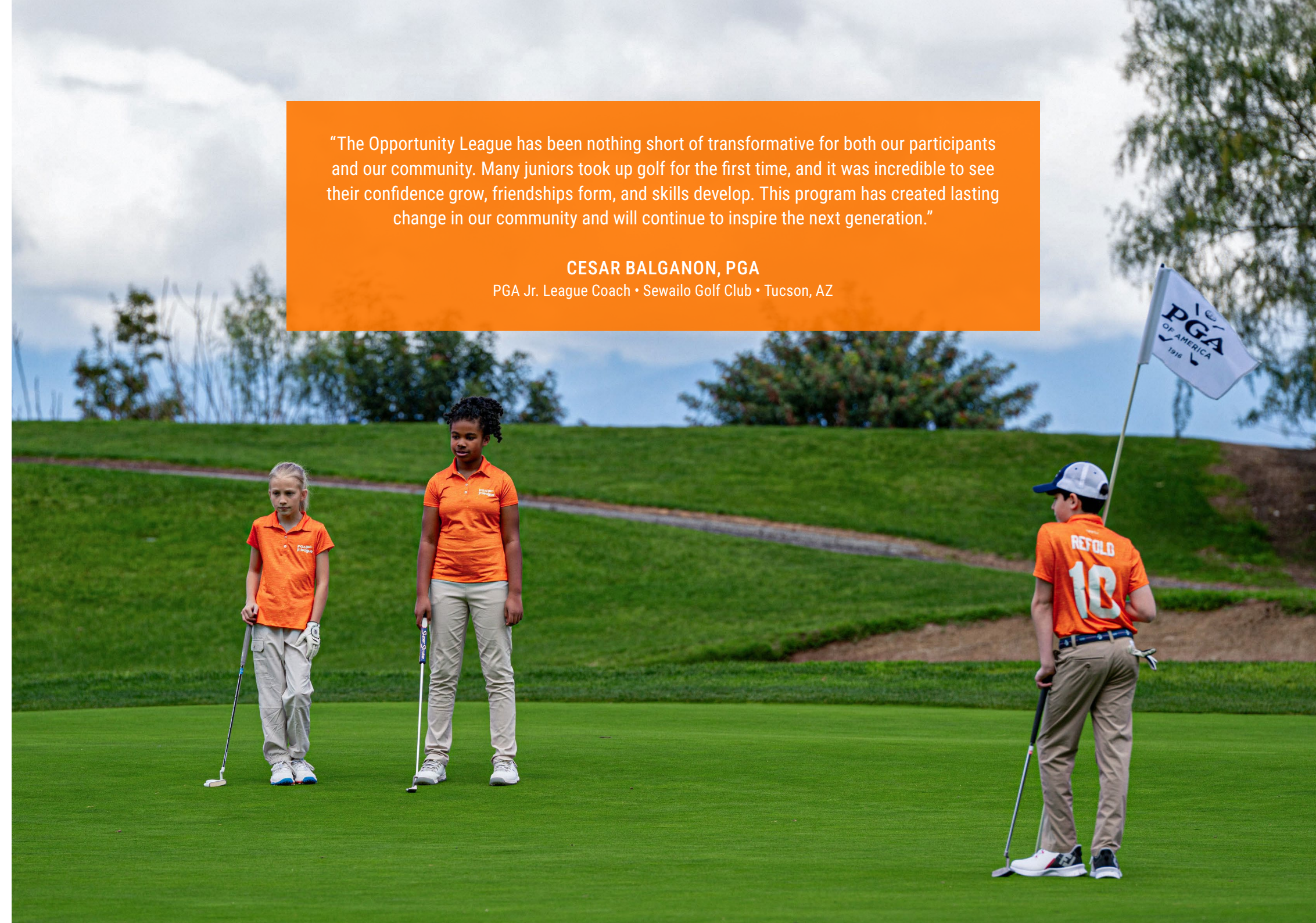

# The Universal Game

How a PGA of America REACH Foundation Opportunity League is Making a Difference

There was a time, more than three generations ago, when golf was a major part of the Miami professional sports landscape. In fact, it was the only professional sport in town if you didn't count minor-league baseball or jai-alai.

Starting in 1962, the PGA Tour held a tournament on Doral Resort & Spa's Blue Monster course, and it was a great source of public pride for the culturally diverse city during its more than half-century run. The resort's name came from a combination of its founders, Doris and Alfred Kaskel, and the Tour event was won by a dozen Hall of Famers ... icons such as Jack Nicklaus, Tiger Woods, Greg Norman, Raymond Floyd, Billy Casper, Lee Trevino, Ernie Els, Nick Faldo, Ben Crenshaw, and Tom Kite.

But when the tournament was moved to Mexico in 2017, golf soon took a backseat in the Magic City to title-winning franchises such as the Miami Dolphins, Florida Marlins, and Miami Heat.

Now, it's not even in the backseat. In a place aptly known as the Sunshine State, where golf is one of the more popular attractions, the sport has become an after-thought in Miami-Dade County. Consider that in an area where 2.7 million people live, there are only six public golf courses in Miami.

The PGA of America is attempting to make golf front and center again by providing access for the next generation. This spring, the PGA of America REACH Foundation funded its first Opportunity League at Miami Springs Golf & Country Club — situated less than 5 miles from Doral. The eight-week Opportunity League is an extension of the Association's PGA Jr. League program offers boys and girls between the ages of nine to 13 an opportunity to learn and play the game in a fun team-oriented environment at no cost to them or their families. The Opportunity League provides equipment and, most importantly, golf-course access, to many kids who have never swung a club before and don't know a birdie from a bogey.

Selecting a city such as Miami Springs, just north of downtown Miami and Miami International Airport, was intentional, says John Moscoso, PGA, the Director of Instruction at Trump Golf Academy Doral who spearheaded the project that also includes Redland Golf & Country Club in Homestead.

"Miami Springs is like old Miami, where things were in 1975," Moscoso said. "It's a town that doesn't like much change. Many of the families live below the poverty level."



Golf is not a cheap game to play, but the values gained usually far outweigh the costs. PGA Jr. League and the PGA of America REACH Foundation Opportunity Leagues are removing any barriers for families to access those values.

"The testimonials we have received from the parents are so grateful," Moscoso said. "Their kids have never gotten involved with golf, and it has sparked an interest for them in the sport. The parents realize this is something their children need to pursue."

As Moscoso mentioned, change doesn't come easy. Most of the kids in the program aren't looking to become the next Tiger Woods or Rory McIlroy. When Grayson Aldama showed up for the program's final session, he wore a uniform with his name and the No. 17 on his back. That's

the number that belongs to his favorite athlete, Shohei Ohtani, the Los Angeles Dodgers' two-way superstar. Grayson is also looking to play two sports, baseball, and golf.

"He enjoys being a dual-sport athlete," said Grayson's father, Jason. "He doesn't want to be a single-sport athlete."

Doing both is better than doing neither, right? Grayson does have a favorite golfer: Bryson DeChambeau. Why?

"Just because he's fun," Grayson said. "He connects with the fans. He waves at the fans. He's just cool."

Miami Springs mayor Walter Fajet, a longtime resident, said he didn't pick up golf until he

was in high school, and he didn't make a big deal of it because it wasn't considered "cool." The Opportunity League targets younger kids, providing a meaningful introduction to the game early in their life in hopes of creating lifetime golfers.

"We've been kind of dreaming of having a youth program that really thrives here," said Fajet, who became mayor in April and was on-hand with several councilmen to watch the Miami Springs Golf & Country Club PGA Jr League's final session. "You look around, seeing all these kids, the support is just amazing. This area is really hungry for this type of youth program. We're just delighted."

Golf programs, like someone's golf game, don't develop overnight. It takes time, money — the city recently bought the golf club from Miami-Dade

County — and a coordinated program to grow the game. Helping the area high schools field golf teams is a step in the proper direction.

"We just want to introduce youngsters to the game of golf," Fajet said. "It's a beautiful game. And we're just really, really happy to have this kind of support."

Kevin Morris, PGA has seen first-hand the importance of getting a golf club in kids' hands, especially those who don't have the resources. The PGA Director of Golf at Miami Springs not only helps run the program, his two children, Kevin and Sophie, are regulars. He knows the impact it has made on their lives.

"We obviously started with zero kids and we're up to 48 here today, along with their parents and family members, so it's pretty incredible," Morris

said. "This is one of the biggest things in all my years as a PGA Professional that has helped grow the game. You can't be prouder than that. And then seeing my kids be a part of it, that's even better, because that's something I can do with them every week."

The League's final session celebrated the progress the kids made over the eight weeks, allowing the players to test their skills at driving, chipping and putting. They even had a launch monitor to see how far their drives traveled and check their swing speed.

"The core values that golf teaches you are the key," Morris said. "Things like honesty, integrity, sportsmanship. They get that with a lot of team sports, but the fact that this is an individual sport, as well as in a team atmosphere here, that's a huge piece of it, right? As long as they're coming out here and having fun, that's the biggest thing. The way I see it with this program is the sky's the limit."

Watching the kids interact, high-fiving after a good shot and giggling after a bad one, shows the

need for this program. Having one of the young girls show up with a unicorn headcover is a reminder they are just kids, after all.

Another girl was asked which was her dominant hand after she hit a poor shot right-handed and threw the ball in frustration left-handed.

"Which hand do you write with?" the instructor asked. "I write with both!" she yelled. "I write with one hand until it gets tired, then I write with the other."

Golf may no longer be the most popular sport in Miami Springs these days, but things change, especially with attention to detail. Another intentional decision by Moscoso is to make sure the instructors can relate to their students.

"We have coaches who are Black and Asian," he said. "One of the reasons the program is successful is the diversity of the coaches and their ability to connect with all the kids."

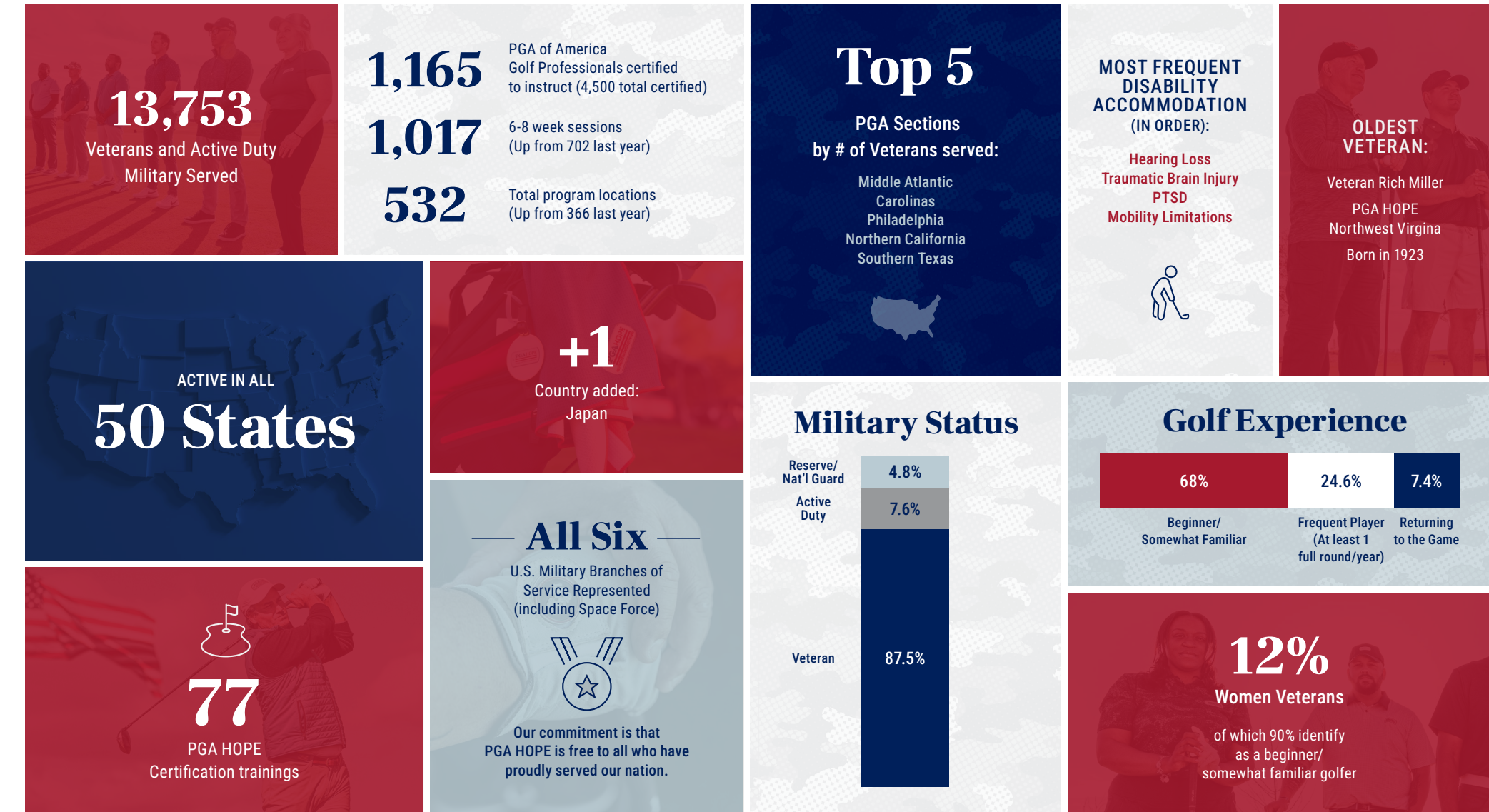
Once the final training session was over, it was time for the kids to be kids — an ice cream truck was brought in for free treats, and hamburgers and chicken wings were provided for lunch.

Then came the real treat that brought smiles to everyone's faces — every child received a pair of FootJoy golf shoes, their own size, much to their joy and amazement. The sky may be the limit, but having free FootJoys on the ground is one way to end this generational golf gap in one of Miami's oldest areas. After the appearance of the PGA of America REACH Foundation Opportunity League, of course.

# Golf, Healing, and Heroes

The Journey of Franko Poynter, a Vietnam Veteran and PGA HOPE Ambassador

A two-hour conversation with Franko Poynter reveals so much about a man who has been through plenty in his 78 years. And yet, he still has so much more to say.

After our interview, this writer awoke the next morning to a humble email sent from the soft-spoken Vietnam Veteran.

“I’m in no way anything special,” Poynter wrote. “I’m just a guy that took a different path in life to serve others. The true heroes are the amazing Veterans across our wonderful nation, and I’m blessed in some way to be a small part of their lives through PGA HOPE.”

Poynter is anything but ordinary, which is one of the many reasons why he represented the Indiana PGA Section in Washington, D.C., in October as one of 19 Ambassadors participating in PGA HOPE National Golf and Wellness Week. PGA HOPE (Helping Our Patriots Everywhere) is the flagship military program of the PGA of America REACH Foundation. It introduces and teaches golf to Veterans and Active Duty Military to enhance their physical, mental, social, and emotional well-being.

That week included time at Congressional Country Club, where the Ambassadors met Jack

Nicklaus, who refereed a putting competition. It was especially meaningful to Poynter, who vividly recalls watching Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer on TV in the early 1960s while growing up in Lebanon, Indiana, 30 miles northwest of Indianapolis.

“It was a childhood dream come true,” Poynter said. “It was so impactful for me that I got to meet my real hero. He is the example that every professional athlete should be. Very few measure up to him. Meeting him was just amazing. Very emotional.”

Poynter himself is a real hero. He joined the Navy in 1964 at age 18 and three years later was serving on river boats in the Mekong Delta in south Vietnam. He admits that many of those he served with in 1967 and 1968 called him “old man.” He was part of the brown water Navy and served during the Tet Offensive, a surprise attack on Jan. 30, 1968, by the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese Army against the South Vietnamese Army and the U.S. military that lasted two months.

“No matter who was in that environment, you’re psychologically affected somehow,” Poynter said. “We had conflict in our own hearts. A lot of us were raised in a Christian environment, but everything we were taught was thrown out the window.



“The other part, for me, here I am a 21-year-old kid, still wet behind the ears and I’m responsible for others. It’s a burden no 21-year-old should ever have. Even now, it’s something that’s always on your mind.”

After returning to the U.S., Poynter still served in the Navy in California for three more years, and admits he was just going through the motions until his enlistment date arrived. “My mom said, ‘I sent away my son, and I got back somebody I don’t know,’” he said.

During those three years, however, Poynter met a woman while back in Indiana on leave. They’d eventually get married and have two sons, William and Jeffrey, who were born at the end of his military career. That marriage ended after eight years and, according to Poynter, she remarried quickly and was awarded custody of the boys. Poynter struggled to see them until there was a confrontation with his ex-wife’s new husband, and

suddenly he received custody of the boys, who he raised as a single parent for three years. “I thought by being married that my life would assume some normalcy,” Poynter said. “I quickly discovered that wasn’t true.”

Poynter married again in 1980 and had daughter Ashley from that relationship, although she was born just as that marriage dissolved. His ex-wife fled Indiana with their newborn. Poynter bought a small farm in Belle Union, Indiana, and, after a few years, found the location of his daughter by chance. She was in Florida, and he attempted to have a relationship, but it wasn’t to be. (Unfortunately, that remains the case today, three decades later.)

“I never ever wanted my daughter to think that I didn’t value her,” he says sadly. “I never missed a child support payment. I increased it when I could.” Poynter says that she’s been in prison on three different occasions and has long struggled with

drug addiction. “That’s a burden I carry every day,” he said. “It weighs on you.”

Luckily, his relationship with his two boys, both now in their 50s, is healthier than ever. They live an hour away.

For most of the last 30 years, however, Poynter lived in Europe and South America — namely Brazil, Portugal, Mexico, Argentina, Panama, Bolivia, Paraguay, and Uruguay. He completed mission trips in Europe. He assisted with a medical mission trip in the Amazon. He helped build homes in Mexico, where he is considered a permanent resident. To earn enough money to support his lifestyle, Poynter would return to Indiana a few months each year to flip houses and work on construction projects with companies that knew his reputation. “I was resourceful,” he said.

During that time abroad, Poynter adopted a Hispanic daughter, Luz, who is now 46. In 2020, he married Estephanny, who has three children of her

own. After returning to Indiana — now living in New Palestine — Poynter helps raise her two boys and a girl who are 8, 9, and 14.

“I’m telling you, I’m blessed beyond measure,” he said. “I get to be a real dad. It’s given me a chance to redeem myself in many ways.”

Two years ago, a Vietnam-era friend from the Marines invited Poynter to a PGA HOPE lesson at the Legends Golf Club in Franklin, Indiana. He was not interested. He was trying to stay isolated from the Veteran community. But after more prodding, Poynter relented and went to the session even though he didn’t own golf clubs. There, he met Crystal Morse, PGA head golf professional at Legends who ran the program. Fifteen minutes later, she had a full set of clubs for Poynter to keep. He was hooked.

“It was something I didn’t know I missed so much,” he said. “It was such a wonderful, calming experience for me.



“I can tell you, that day, when I got back into my truck, I lost it. I completely lost it. I could not shut the tears off. It overwhelmed me. As I was driving home, I was thinking, man, if this does this for me, I can’t imagine what it would do for all the Veterans who can be associated with it.”

**You run the program and you don’t realize that impact. I had no idea that he sat in his truck and cried. To hear that and how much it meant to Franko, the fact that we went through it together, it’s rewarding and I’m so thankful [for PGA HOPE].**

Two years after that initial session, Poynter was in Washington, D.C., representing his beloved Hoosier state as an Ambassador at PGA HOPE’s National Golf and Wellness Week. He was treated as if he was a member at Congressional, which is where he met Nicklaus in the putting competition. He returned home reinvigorated, with ideas about how he can help the Veterans in his area take advantage of the benefits of PGA HOPE.

Andrew Jent, the director of player development at the Indiana PGA, and Poynter have already discussed recruiting tactics. And just as importantly, they want to make sure they look after the alumni once they complete the program.

“The biggest thing I’ve seen with him is how outward he is with people,” Jent said. “At first, he was a little shy, but he always had a smile on his face. As I got to know him more, he’s now genuinely asking about me. How am I doing?

What’s going on in your world? Trying to make the personal connection.

“We want him to be the face of our graduate program. What are things that people are talking about that we’re missing? If they don’t feel comfortable coming to anyone else, they can go to Franko and talk about an idea.”

It’s a role that Poynter relishes and one he’s prepared to tackle, just as he has everything else in his life. He served in Vietnam, has been to places far and wide, has experiences that not many else have had. He’s even defeated bladder cancer, which has reoccurred several times over the years and has caused him to have six different operations.

“Some things still to this day don’t make sense,” he said. “If you’re in an experience and you have triggers, you can go back and think about something that’s as real today as it was 50 years ago. Because you’re experiencing the same emotions. All that drama that was in your life and how you sorted through it. I think a lot of vets, including myself, pretty soon you become callous to what’s around you. You withdraw back within yourself.

“I don’t want these younger guys to carry that dark shadow for all the years that I carried it. That’s what motivates me — not only my healing process, but to be a part of the healing process for somebody else.”

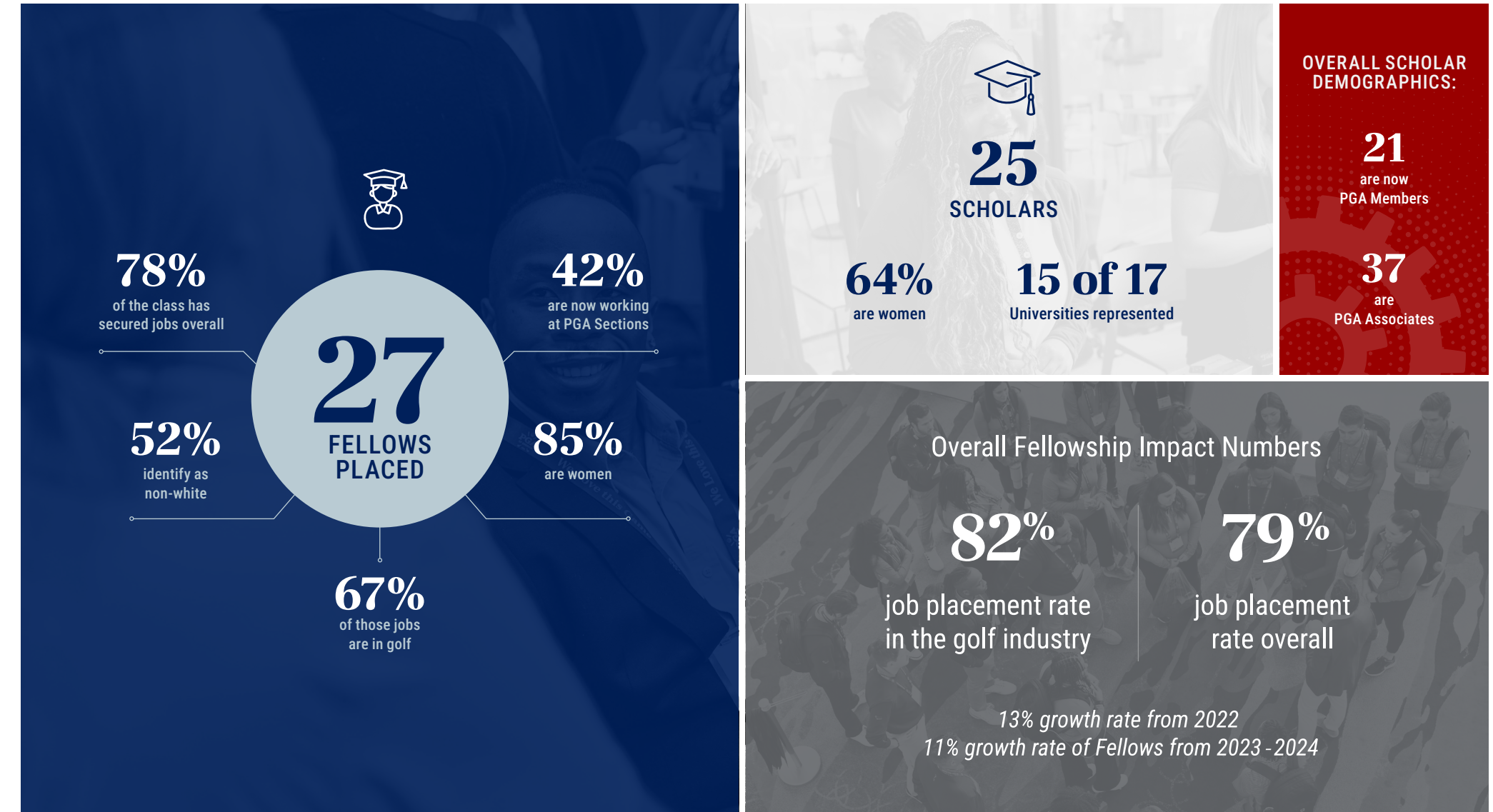

# Game Changers

How PGA WORKS is Helping Emily Jones Forge A New Path in the Game She Loves

The game of golf is all-reaching. It's a universal game that connects us, challenges us, and can even forge a new path that we never even knew existed. Golf has continuously developed as a game that everyone can love and enjoy, and these days, its industry has become one of the most powerful in all of sports.

As we reflect on and celebrate the pioneers of our game we look to the likes of Charlie Sifford, Lee Elder, and countless others — how they broke barriers on some of the most prominent stages in the game. We think about LPGA and PGA of America Professional, Renee Powell and her continued trailblazing legacy she and her family have built at the Clearview Golf Club in East Canton, Ohio.

If you take a 65-mile trek up Interstate 77, you'll find yourself in Cleveland Heights, the hometown of PGA WORKS Fellow for the Northern Ohio PGA Section, Emily Jones.

A lifelong golfer, Emily was first introduced to the game by her father. "It's kind of all I've known," says Emily. "There are pictures of me from when I was around four or five years old, going to the driving range with my siblings." It wasn't until she was about eight years old that she took more of

a liking to the game and got involved in a local youth program called The Greater Cleveland Junior Golf Scholarship Fund (GCJGSF), whose mission is to empower Cleveland's youth through the game of golf.

"It was just really fun for me," says Emily. "It was something I did every Saturday morning. My dad would drop me off at Shawnee Hills Golf Course, and I really loved being around the other kids." As Emily grew older, she played all the sports — from soccer, basketball, track and field, and even softball — but eventually decision time came. "Around eighth grade, I was really focused on softball and golf, and I remember thinking to myself, 'Man, softball is really messing with my golf swing!'"

And the rest is history. But even Emily couldn't imagine what the game would be able to provide for her.

Emily played golf all four years of high school golf and then got involved in Club Golf at the University of Dayton. Emily would earn her degree in Early Childhood Education where, during the summers, she helped run junior clinics at Shaker Heights Country Club back home in Cleveland. This eventually led to other opportunities like



interning for the Northern Ohio PGA Junior Tour and the GCJGSF — the same two organizations that helped introduce her and shape the love she now has for the game. Emily graduated from the University of Dayton in 2024 and started her PGA WORKS Fellowship shortly after.

As the fifth PGA WORKS Fellow for the Northern Ohio Section, Emily gets to be involved in just about every aspect of the business. "It's definitely all-encompassing," notes Emily. "And I feel like my scope has grown each day that I've been a part of the team." She acknowledges that even though she had a pseudo-headstart being an intern for the Section's Junior Tour, she emphasizes that there is so much more that the Section does year-round.

"It's helped me see myself in other areas of the golf industry. Even though I got my degree in

education, golf has always been a passion of mine," says Emily. "The Fellowship has allowed me to mesh those two worlds and helped me see where in golf I fit in, but also gives me a chance to figure out what skills I can transfer from my education background." Emily admits, there is a lot she didn't realize about the industry, and that's why this opportunity to be a PGA WORKS Fellow was so important to her. She believes the Fellowship is fighting headwinds in the industry to create pathways and provide needed exposure and access to the game that simply wasn't available even ten years ago.

On paper, Emily's story is like many other successful young professionals who have found their way to a career in golf. There's an upbeat and bright charisma about her presence, so one would think golf is written in the stars for her. However, Emily's passion for the game and the

industry lies much deeper — to her, it's about representation and showing up for other girls who look like her.

"When I was growing up, I didn't have that representation — especially as I started playing on larger junior tours ... I was very much the only one who looked like me," recalls Emily. "The reason I want to be in the golf industry is to change this narrative — because the first step to change is to be in the position that I'm in, and if I'm not in this position then there's one less person who looks like me in golf." She even recalls times showing up to a tournament and giving pep talks to herself saying, 'You belong here, so go show them why.'

The echoes of those pep talks have carried Emily throughout her time as a Fellow. She even talks about how she has seen the Fellowship shape communities within and beyond the game. She emphasizes that it provides this space for a

broader audience to experience the game in a non-traditional way. She says it helps establish a foundation for basic skills that can transfer to other industries. "It provides confidence," says Emily. "Once you wrap up the Fellowship, it gives you the self-assurance that you can go and be a leader somewhere else."

It almost begs the question, how will her storyline unfold? What is the history and the legacy that Emily Jones will leave behind?

While it may be cliché, Emily says she sees so many connections to the game of golf and how we navigate our own lives. "I went to school to be a teacher, and I believe everything that would make me a good teacher is helping me forge my own path in golf. Like teachers who use their skills to help the greater good and the next generation, I want to use golf as a tool to do the same. It's more than a game to me."



The Fellowship has allowed me to mesh those two worlds and helped me see where in golf I fit in, but also gives me a chance to figure out what skills I can transfer from my education background.

To Emily, she finds it encouraging that the industry continues to see an influx of programs, access points, and new innovative technology that is making the game more relatable to new groups. "Putting clubs in hands is one thing, but I think the industry has to continue to push the envelope when it comes to helping people find golf experiences — and this may not necessarily happen on a golf course." To Emily, long gone are the days of needing to be a member of a country club — golf experiences are happening in new and

unassuming places. Emily sees herself leading the next generation in some capacity, whether this is giving lessons as a PGA of America Member or administering programs through a PGA Section office that provides boys and girls access to the game.

One truth remains steadfast, Emily's heart and eagerness for the game she loves will springboard her to new heights — for not only her own good, but for all those who cross paths with her in golf and beyond.

"We're just going to keep figuring it out as it goes, but I'm so excited for what the game continues to hold for me."

## HISTORY OF THE CHAMPIONSHIP

1965

Dr. Herschel J. "Herk" Cochran establishes the National Negro Golf Association (NNGA) in Lebanon, Pennsylvania.

1984

William "Bill" Dickey founded the National Minority Junior Golf Scholarship Association (today's Bill Dickey Scholarship Association).

1986

HBCUs are not invited to the NCAA Regional Golf Tournament. Dr. Herschel J. Cochran establishes the Cleveland Chapter of the NNGA.

1987

First National Minority Intercollegiate Golf Tournament (later the National Minority Collegiate Golf Championship) at Highland Park Golf Course in Cleveland, Ohio.

1990

Career Day (now the PGA WORKS Career Expo), created by Barbara Douglas, debuts with Allied Associations, manufacturers and publications.

1993

Rashida Moore, of Texas Southern University, becomes the first Women's Medalist.

1995

Fayetteville State University wins its first Division II title.

1996

Tiger Woods, accompanied by his father, Earl, conducts a Junior Clinic during the National Minority College Golf Championship at Highland Park Golf Course, in Cleveland, Ohio.

1998

PGA Golf Club, in Port St. Lucie, Florida, becomes the host site of the Championship. Bethune-Cookman University captures its first Women's Division crown.

1999

Bethune-Cookman University claims its first Men's Division title.

2000

Highlights from the 2000 National Minority College Golf Championship were aired on The Golf Channel, the first time black collegiate golf received a prime-time airing.

2005

Tennessee State, wins the men's Division I National Minority College Golf Championship – making Coach Catana Starks the first African-American woman to coach a men's team; and also win an NCAA Division I men's golf tournament.

2006

The PGA of America is granted ownership and management of the Championship by the National Minority Collegiate Golf Scholarship Fund and hosts the renamed PGA Minority Collegiate Golf Championship.

2007

Jackson State University men's team becomes the first HBCU to receive an invitation to an NCAA Regional golf tournament.

2012

Brown Capital Management begins a three-year presenting partnership of the Championship, making it the first black-owned business to partner with a PGA of America-sanctioned championship.

2014

Tiana Jones, of South Carolina State University and University of Maryland Eastern Shore, earns Women's Medalist honors, the first of a record five overall titles.

2016

CastleOak Securities (black-owned business) serves as presenting sponsor for two years with PGA Minority Collegiate Golf Championship highlights program airing on Golf Channel.

2019

PGA Minority Collegiate Championship and Business of Golf Career Expo rebranded as the PGA WORKS Collegiate Championship and PGA WORKS Career Expo to align with the PGA WORKS strategic initiative to diversify the golf industry's workforce.

2023

GOLF Channel and Peacock provide live broadcast for the first time in Championship history at Shoal Creek Club. Junior PGA WORKS is reintroduced for the first time since the late 1990's.
